

Coming into February leads me to think of Valentine's Day, which leads me to think of love. And that reminds me of a quote from Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, who some called "the world's most famous man" for his preaching and abolitionist activism before, during, and after the Civil War. Henry's father, Rev. Lyman Beecher, was what we might call a Very Severe Christian: the family prayed often, sang hymns, learned their scripture, and had no time for frivolity, dance, theater, or anything but the most elevated literature. They did not celebrate Christmas or birthdays. And as you might imagine, attendance was required at all worship and prayer meetings, of which

Lyman held many. Henry grew up immersed in the church, but it was one which he described later as more fearful obligation than joyful gift. The quote I am reminded of this month comes from Henry's later years, and offers a compelling commentary on his life as a man who was always in the church. I leave it for your consideration and thought: "I never knew how to worship until I knew how to love."

May you be blessed in your pondering, and in these wintry days of February!

Construction Underway!

At Pilgrim Center in early January, construction began on the new Ley Chapel, scheduled for completion by the end of May. The chapel will be an air conditioned and heated (through geo-thermal heat) worship space with a magnificent wall-ofglass view of Green Lake. Funds for the chapel came mostly from a special fundraising campaign, some private donation, and from our OCWM giving. Pastor David is part of the Pilgrim Center Site Committee, which designed the chapel.

Larry called the meeting to order. Pastor David opened with a prayer.

The December Council minutes were reviewed. Rob noted that the date of the minutes was incorrect; it read November and should have been December. Nancy also noted that the company doing our repair work was Eau Claire Insulation, not Installation. Kay moved we accept the minutes as amended, Nancy seconded, approved.

Financial Secretary Report/ Treasurer:

Income this month was \$14,178.82, expenses were \$13506.42 leaving us with a December gain of \$672.40 and a check book balance of \$1158.95. A snow removal bill of \$625 was paid.

Memorial Fund Report:

The balance for the end of the month is \$3761.08. Barb made a motion to bring the undesignated funds to a balance of \$5371 and then zero out the remaining balance in the miscellaneous account and the mission accounts to offset the borrowed funds account. Kay seconded, motion approved. Rob will have Mimi redo the report so that we can keep better track of the gifts given to the Memorial Fund.

Building Fund Report:

At the end of December the balance is \$32032.53.

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Christian Education Commission:

Christmas Pageant was a great success. Kay expressed many thanks to Deb Zehms and the kids for all their hard work. They sent three confirmands to the Jesus Core Retreat at Pilgrim Center, January 10. Pastor David and Nancy went along to chaperone. They sent Christmas cards with their picture on them to the shut-ins. They also made bird/critter feeders to put on the Christmas tree outside.



Stewardship went over the 2009 budget. The pledge drive so far is \$51,000 compared to last year's \$60,000. The second request for pledges just went out, so there should be more pledges coming in. On Ash Wednesday, February 25, there will be a Potato Supper again.

Worship Commission:

The Christmas Eve Service had good attendance. We took down the Christmas decorations on January 10. Only four people showed up to help. We have to make sure we advertise this better next year. We will be organizing Lent and Easter next.

Service Commission:

No report.

Building and Grounds:

Eau Claire Insulation has finished all the repair work. The bill will come in at about \$4700. The sump pump went out and had to be replaced. We have a bill of \$478.44 from Wiersgalla to pay. We

will bring that to the congregation and ask for permission to pay out of the Building Fund. The snow plower has been doing a great job.

Women of Plymouth:

They have purchased a new can opener for the kitchen and are now looking for silverware baskets for the dishwasher. They are changing the monthly meetings to the first Monday of the month at 7:00 P.M. They will have a Cabin Fever Breakout on a Saturday in February. They have also purchased a memorial book for Mimi to record gifts in. The \$1000 scholarship for Cyndi will be sent to the school.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor David made 27 visits in December. He purchased two more microphones and two mic stands from the Memorial Fund. The ecumenical worship service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is Monday, January 19 at 7:00 P.M. at Lake Street Methodist Church. Pastor David will be preaching. Ash Wednesday is February 25. On Feb 1, Mark Ruddy from Treatment Instead of Prison will be here during the pot luck to talk to people who might be interested in that organization.

Nominating Committee Report:

Nancy presented the slate of officers which will be voted on at the Annual Meeting. We still have a vacancy for Moderator Elect.

Mission Committee:

The pot luck on February 1 will be a "Favorite Dish Potluck." Mark Ruddy from Treatment Instead of Prison will be there for anyone who is interested. Kay's "Walking through History" presentation will be at the March 1 pot luck.

Listening Sessions:

Kathryn Hamilton is interested in the Listening Sessions; we need to get one more person to attend the training sessions with her.

Personnel Committee:

They met with the three employees and discussed any problems or successes.

New Business:

- The 2009 budget was presented and passed on to the Congregational Meeting for final approval.
- The Annual Meeting will be January 25. Council will provide bars and refreshments.
- There was a question on whether we stopped mailing the newsletter out, now that we are emailing. The printed version of the newsletter is still sent out to those who did not request email copies. They are sent out at the same time the email is sent. If someone is not getting the newsletter and should be, Mimi needs to know so she can correct the problem. If she doesn't know there is a problem, she can not correct it.

Larry thanked everyone on the Council and Commissions for their service this year. Pastor David closed with a prayer.

Meeting adjourned 8:30 P.M.
