
Stewardship update

Executive Council Minutes

December 14, 2009

Members present: Larry Kleist, Barb Kleist, Nancy Wendt, Kay Stecher, Rob Jaenke, Jim Welk, Char Kozlowski, Aurora Bradbury-Schoening and Pastor David Huber

Nancy called the meeting to order and opened with devotional reading. The November Council minutes were reviewed and accepted.

Financial Reports:

As of November 30, 2009

Treasurer's Report:

Income this month was \$6592.89; expenses were \$7278.79 leaving us with November loss of \$685.90 and a check book balance of - \$733.47. \$1000.00 was taken out of the Reserve Fund to cover the negative balance in the check book. The only large unusual expense this month was the quarterly payment for the building insurance. We still have not paid any of our OCWM or special offerings to the Conference. Rob reported that the envelope giving is down about \$6800 for the year. He will be paying St. Francis Food Pantry around \$470 in December. Expenses are down about \$5000.00 for the year. The Reserve Fund balance is now \$1786.50. Women of Plymouth will be giving \$500 for OCWM. The nut fund will be used to pay the special OCWM funds.

Memorial Fund Report:

The balance for the end of the month is \$7173.69. We still owe the Memorial Fund \$1667.35 from the General Fund.

Building Fund Report:

The balance for the end of November is \$30,497.50. The Stewardship Commission will make a decision early next year on the checking account for the building fund, since we will not be collecting any more funds.

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.



Kay reported that the kids made cards for the children for Thanksgiving and received a really nice thank-you back from the Gosbins. The crafts they made for the Bazaar were a big success, they sold most of them. The kids worked the table at the Bazaar too. The Christmas Pageant will be on December 20. Kay thanked the youth for helping out with this in advance. The Adult class will start discussing hymns in January. There will be no classes December 27 or January 3.

Stewardship Commission:

Larry will be meeting with the Interior Committee to discuss the first banner to be selected. We now have four designs. Audrey and Dorothy Kruschke will be going through our artifacts to determine what is worth keeping. So far the Stewardship campaign has produced 26 pledges for a total of around \$48,000, which is \$5000 less than last year. There are

still outstanding pledges that haven't been turned in yet and a reminder letter will go out to those people. As of this meeting the profit for the nuts is \$781.50.

Worship Commission:

Barb reported that they decorated for Advent and Christmas. Along with the pageant on the 20th, there will be a hymn sing. Christmas Eve Service will be at 6:00 P.M this year. Saturday, January 9 we will be taking down the Christmas Decorations and everyone is invited to help.

Building & Grounds:

The new snow removal service was called back by Ron for not doing a very good job and all that they were being paid for. Hopefully, this has now been corrected.

Women of Plymouth:

They made around \$2600 at the Bazaar this year. They served 111 adult dinners and 4 children's. They need new letters for the sandwich board and asked if anyone knows where to get them. They are going to meet four times a year this year. They will be giving funds to both OCWM and the General Fund before the end of the year. They also need someone to be in charge of the funerals.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor David made 30 visits in November. He will be on vacation from December 25 to January 2. Rev. Pirazzini will cover while he is gone from December 25–30 and Dick Waltmire will cover from December 31 to January 2. He led worship at Heatherwood and is now on their rotation of pastors for leading worship.

Nominating Committee:

Larry has nominees for all of the Executive Council except for Moderator Elect and Service Commission chair. He still has some openings on the commissions and needs another PIP member this year.

One Great Mission:

Barb reported that they took over 22 stockings for the children at St. Francis Food Pantry. There will be no pot luck in January.

Annual Reports:

The annual reports are due to Mimi by January 10. The annual meeting is January 31.

Other Business:

Cyndi is on contract through March 28 at Bloomer and will only be here one Sunday a month. She will keep David and the Council informed as to her situation, so that we can get replacements for her. Jim Welk reported that he has found the church's silver at his home. After discussion regarding the insurance coverage, it was decided that he will bring it to the church to be stored, as our building coverage should cover it.

2010 Budget:

Rob presented the 2010 budget. Several changes were discussed and made, including one to lower our OCWM pledge for next year, so as not to distort the conference budget, if we can't make the payments to them. Kay moved the budget be approved with changes and sent to the congregation for approval at the annual meeting. Aurora seconded, motion passed. Many thanks to Rob for all his work on the budget.
