

Pastor's Pen



Dear Friends,

We are reading through the Acts of the Apostles, the story of the first generation of the church, this summer. The vast majority of the book never gets read in the lectionary cycle. This is too bad, because it has much to teach us. Some of you have commented that you are enjoying reading larger sections of scripture (two and three chapters each week) and that you have been learning much from the experience. I'm glad that you are finding it as fun and enlightening as I am.

So far we have read the story of Pentecost. We've read how the early followers of The Way (they weren't called Christians for about 15 more years) shared all that they had in common so that no one was in need. We read stories of persecution by the Jewish leadership and miraculous rescues of the apostles from prison. We've watched the church grow from about 120 followers in Jerusalem before Pentecost to number in the thousands all over Israel. We read about the stoning of Stephen, our first martyr. Then we had Saul's conversion from a Pharisee persecuting Jesus' followers into one of Jesus' greatest evangelists. We read Peter's vision that the Good News of Jesus Christ wasn't just for Jewish people, but for all the people of the world. And so much more. Summarizing ten chapters in one paragraph isn't easy!

But in all this, even though Acts is the story of the early Christians, its bigger story is the acts of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the initiator of all the preaching, the rescues, the conversions, and Saul's and Peter's changes of heart. The church's story is really the Holy Spirit's story. Just as it is today. The church's story, including Plymouth, is the story of faithful people trying to listen to the movement of the Holy Spirit to be the people of God. The Holy Spirit in Acts constantly led people to a

greater expansion of the circle of who is "in." Greater inclusivity, greater tolerance of others, greater love toward those they thought to be "other" or "foreign" and thus outside of God's love. The early church was led to include Samaritans, Greeks, and Romans. They were led to include women, the sick, the poor, and the outcast. In modern days, the church (especially the United Church of Christ) has been driven to include African Americans and help end slavery, to include women in leadership, and to include minorities, foreigners, immigrants, gays and lesbians, the mentally ill and disabled, the physically disabled, and others that society has spurned, left behind, or ignored, even when doing so has led to persecution, ridicule, or other inconveniences.

One other thing the early Christians did very well was invite people to hear about Jesus. We can't all spread the Gospel in foreign lands and we don't have to. Eau Claire is a big enough mission field. What we can all do is what the apostles did: invite someone to church. That's how the church grew back then, and that's how it grows now. Invite someone to worship, or Vacation Bible School, or a movie night. Most people who come to a church do so because a member invited them. It's really that simple. Here's your chance to be like the apostles. Bring someone to church in the coming months, and see what the Holy Spirit can do, with them and you.

Executive Council Minutes

July 12, 2010

Larry called the meeting to order. Pastor David opened with a prayer. The June Council minutes were reviewed. There was one correction; the dates for the Movie nights were incorrect. Corrected minutes were approved.

Financial Reports:

Treasurer's Report:

Income this month was \$,9418.50; expenses were \$9,820.27 leaving us with a June loss of \$401.77 and a check book balance of \$307.66. The Pie & Ice Cream Social brought in \$1,251.30 and helped us to make our bills. Some of the larger expenses were: the building insurance payment of \$808.58, water bill of \$341.26, lawn mowing of \$400.00 and health insurance of \$1789.09. As of the end of June our envelope giving was up about \$5139. We also collected \$78 for OCWM and \$171 for the food pantry and those amounts have been forwarded on.

Reserve Fund Report:

The Reserve Fund has a balance of \$3,873.92 at the end of June. We did not use Reserve Fund money to pay any bills in June.

Memorial Fund Report:

The balance for the end of the month is \$5,714.48.

Building Fund Report:

Balance \$26,516.41

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Christian Education Commission:

They had a family movie night June 30 and will have another one on July 28. The movie will be "The Chronicles of Narnia-Prince Caspian." VBS will be August 10-12. The theme is "Creative Christian Kids". All ages are encouraged to attend. Register with Mimi at the church office. All the Moon Beach Campers had a great time. The Commission gives many thanks to the congregation for the continued support of the campers.

Stewardship Commission:

We served around 40-45 fewer meals than last year. They are looking at ways to improve the event. They are looking into having banners made for Advent and Lent.

Worship Commission:

They are going to try an outdoor worship service on Wednesday August 25 at 6:15.

Building and Grounds:

We have a dead tree along the driveway that we will have to deal with. Larry will ask Ron about fixing the ceiling in the foyer.

Women of Plymouth:

They have decided on the funeral fees. They will charge \$75 for up to 100 guests and \$100 for over 100, plus the cost of the food. If the people would like a caterer, they will hire the caterer for them. Larry said he would update our Wedding & Funeral procedures for the next meeting.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor David made 44 visits in June and performed one wedding. He led worship at Heatherwood on June 30. MADD Camp was quite a success. He will have another wedding in August and also in January. Neither will be at the church. The Wisconsin Conference voted to accept the restructuring proposal and will implement it by July 1, 2011.

Other Business:

- We had a visitor from the Wisconsin Conference to address how a congregation becomes an Open and Affirming church. We were under the impression we already were, but we evidently did not send in a statement to the Conference. We will have Mimi check the old minutes from 1985–1986, to see if there is anything in them. Otherwise this would be something to bring up at the Annual Meeting in January.
- Deb brought up the fact that we should start thinking about major repairs we will have to make in the next ten years or so, such as a new roof, flooring for the nursery and

kitchen, painting for Fellowship Hall, electrical work outside and the parking lot. Some of the money in the Building Fund should be used for that.

- 125th Anniversary: Deb needs more recipes. Jeanny House will preach on that Sunday, which is September 12. We will also have pot luck.
