

To provide a worshipful and spiritual journey for us, the Worship Commission is again planning special Sunday worship services, plus Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Easter morning, and Wednesday night soup and scripture. EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MINUTES February 14, 2011

Members present: Larry Kleist, Barb Kleist, Kay Stecher, Jim Welk, Louise Partlow, Deb Zehms, Char Kozlowski, Aurora Bradbury-Schoening, Rob Jaenke and Pastor David Huber.

Deb called the meeting to order. The January Council minutes were reviewed and approved.

Financial Reports:

Memorial Fund Balance	\$6,520.17

Treasurer's Report:

Income this month was \$14,994.40; expenses were \$13,089.20 leaving us with a January gain of \$1,905.20 and a check book balance of \$1,939.23. \$244 was paid to the food pantry and \$167 to OCWM. Our annual Association dues of \$645.00 were also paid.

Reserve Fund Report:

The Reserve Fund has a balance of \$997 at the end of January.

Memorial Fund Report:

The balance for the end of the month is \$6,520.17. \$1,000 was paid for the new display cabinet from the McLeod memorial. \$1,000 was paid toward the new floor in the nursery from the Tubbs memorial. The balance for the floor will be paid in February.

Building Fund Report:

The balance at the end of December was \$26,650.25. Since there were no further deposits or interest in January, the balance remains the same.

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Christian Education Commission:

Kay reported that the Sunday School kids helped raise money for "The Souper Bowl of Caring" while performing two skits: 1/30/11 and 2/6/11. We had a record participation year, with \$453.00 raised for the St. Francis Food Pantry. The February Film Festival is currently running and will raise money for our five Moon Beach Campers. The Sunday School children also made Valentine cards for the shut-ins.

Stewardship Commission:

Larry reported that we are expecting the new banner for Lent by Ash Wednesday. There will be a potato supper served on March 9 preceding the Ash Wednesday service. The Plymouth Annual Thrift Sale will be held April 29 and 30.

Worship Commission:

Barb reported the Ash Wednesday potato supper will start at 6 P.M. The theme for the Wednesday Lent services will be "Gifts Given to Jesus." The Easter service will begin at 9:30 A.M., with the Magnificent Muffin Morning fundraiser beginning at 8:15 A.M.

Building and Grounds:

Larry reported that the carpets have been cleaned free of charge by Maug Cleaning. Business cards will be left outside of the Sanctuary if anyone is interested in their services. The Fellowship Hall and front hallway were painted by Mr. Jaenke.

Women of Plymouth:

They are planning a Cabin Fever Breakout February 19.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor David made 36 visits in January. We welcomed two new members to the church on January 23. Our newspaper ad has been changed to include the Open and Affirming statement, and should be reflected in Saturday's paper. Our Facebook page and website have also been updated. Pastor David will be attending the Festival of Homiletics Monday, May 16 through Friday, May 20. The WI Conference Annual Meeting will be June 10–12, and we can send two delegates. The Conference board continues to implement the restructuring changes.

Commission reports were accepted as given.

Other Business:

- The final copy of the wedding/funeral policy will be approved by the Women of Plymouth.
- We will continue to announce the new cards for the Service Commission record keeping, allowing us to keep track of which shut-ins are being visited by members of the congregation, so that we can be sure no one is missed.
