... but we're not out of the woods yet

Thanks to everyone who responded to our Red Letter. At this point we are only slightly below our giving level from last year. However, we are still in a financially precarious position because our expenses for lawn service, snow removal and electricity have increased. We have had to borrow \$6,000 from the Building Fund in order to keep our heads above water, and it will take a united effort from everyone to keep our financial boat afloat. Here's how you can help: Make sure you are up to date with your pledge for this year. (You can call Mimi at 715-835-5475 during office hours to find out your status.) If you are up to date, please consider a special gift to Plymouth. Finally, please support all of the fund raising projects offered by Plymouth, such as the Thrift Sale, the Pie and Ice Cream Social, the Bazaar and the Mega Scrip Program (for details on how this works, see the next article). Again thanks ... together we can do what needs to be done.

Scrip comes to Plymouth

For the last couple of months, some members of Plymouth Church have been participating in the Mega Scrip program. It is a painless, cost-free fundraiser for our church. Here is how it works: On Sunday, you fill out a form requesting Mega Scrip cards for \$25, \$50, and/or \$100. You pay for the cards when you order, with cash or check made out to Plymouth. We are able to keep 3% of the money that is paid for the cards, and pay Mega the remaining amount. So, if you pay for a \$100 card, we pay Mega \$97 and keep \$3 to help pay our bills. The next Sunday, your gift cards will be waiting for you at church to spend at Mega or Mega Holiday at their full value. Use them at Mega Holiday, and get cheaper gas for paying cash! So, by helping the church, you also gain that cash discount!

This is a fundraiser that costs you nothing, requires almost no effort on your part, and can save you money. In the two months or so that we have been participating, we have earned \$157. We hope that more members of the church will be willing and able to participate in this ongoing fundraiser. If you are a shopper at Gordy's or Festival, and would be willing to buy Scrip cards for those locations (which includes Gordy's gas stations as well), please let Larry Kleist know this. If enough people would buy Scrip cards for those businesses, we will offer them along with Mega cards.

Scrip order forms are on the table by the entrance to the sanctuary. See Larry or Deb Zehms if you would like help with your order form. Please consider buying Scrip. What an easy way to help our church pay the bills!

PASTOR'S PEN EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MINUTES



Income this month was \$14,354.30, expenses were \$14,058.00; leaving us with a July gain of \$296.30 and a check book balance of \$597.09. \$6000.00 was borrowed from the Building Fund. \$2000.00 was deposited from the Women of Plymouth. \$57.75 was deposited from the Mega SCRIP cards.

Reserve Fund Report:

Balance of \$1031.55 at the end of July.

Memorial Fund Report:

The balance for the end of the July is \$4,125.32.

Building Fund Report:

\$6000 was loaned to the General Fund. The balance at the end of July was \$15,759.26.

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Christian Education Commission:

VBS 2011—"Beatitudes Attitudes" was a great success! Many thanks to the Christian Education Commission, Pastor David, and Dorothy Gilbertson for their leadership, and to the

children—Carter, John, and Morgan for making it all come alive! Soft and cuddly pillows made by the children will be distributed by Western Dairyland. This will be an ongoing mission for our Sunday School. We collected \$140 to send to the "What If Foundation" during VBS week. This organization feeds hungry children in Haiti. Many thanks to everyone who so generously contributed to this worthy cause! This congregation is great!



Stewardship Commission:

Rob reported that the Mega SCRIP cards seem to be working well. We made \$57.75 this month, \$156.00 year-to-date. Also discussed opening SCRIP for Gordy's and Festival, if there is enough interest. People should contact Larry if they are interested in either business.

A lot was learned about music in progressive worship, and a good confirmation that we have been doing many things correctly. New music was acquired, looking forward to implementing it in services. The NWA Division on Church and Ministry has met twice at Plymouth, and it is working out to be a good partnership. The Conference is progressing in the new structure, with adjustments being made.

Other Business:

- Plymouth participated in the Chippewa Valley Pride festival with a booth and flyers about our Open and Affirming views.
- We received a letter that the wooded lot needs to be tidied where it is dropping on neighbor's lawns.
- Deb and Hannah are painting the

roadside sign. We are looking at fixing the electricity to the lighting for the current sign vs. installing a new lit sign.
