### Sunday morning Summer Bible Study



## PASTOR'S PEN

---

Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

Earlier this month, the Muslim month of Ramadan began. During Ramadan, the tradition is to fast during the daylight hours, abstaining not only from food, but even water. At the end of the day is a meal for breaking the fast called Iftar. This year, the mosque in Altoona invited me, Mike Henry, and other clergy to share an Iftar meal with them on the first Sunday after Ramadan started. Since the fast cannot be ended until sundown, that meant we didn't start eating until after 9 pm! We gathered at the mosque, and were able to watch and listen as they prayed. Then we had the meal. And what a meal it was! Serving tray after tray of lamb, stuffed grape leaves, eggplant, fruits, rice, and a kitchen counter full of desserts. We ate and ate, enjoying the company of our hosts. I ended up at a table with a few young men (mid to late twenties I think) from India and was able to hear their stories of coming to the U.S. to work, and what life was like for them in the area in India from which they came. They had come from a heavily Hindu majority area, with only a very small percentage of Muslims and Christians. Finding work, getting an apartment, getting an education, etc., were very difficult there because of religious prejudice against the Muslims and Christians. Interesting stories, and not so different from the reasons my great-grandparents moved from Germany to the U.S. Simply looking for a better opportunity.

After the meal we went back into their sanctuary for a presentation and discussion on Muslim and Christian

ideas of gratitude and happiness, and a chance to learn from one another about some of our traditions. The presenters had everyone in the room, including the children, say something that they are grateful for. And again, not so different in answers, no matter the religion. There was gratefulness for living where we live, for children and spouses, for neighbors and community, for work and play, and for love.

It is my hope that more and more of these cross-cultural and interfaith encounters can take place, both here and around the world. It is amazing how hearing someone's story, learning their name, and hearing them talk about love for family and worries over loved ones, makes them less scary, less strange, and more like a neighbor.

May you find new neighbors this month.

July 8, 2013

Barb called the meeting to order at 7:00. The June minutes were read and approved.

**Financial Reports:**

As of June 30, 2013

Year to Date Income	\$57,370.49
Year to Date Expenses	\$56,467.78
Ahead (Behind)	(\$902.71)

**Treasurer's Report:**

Income for June was \$12,327.50 (includes \$5,000 transferred from Building Fund); expenses were \$11,066.37 for a gain of \$1,261.13. Bank balance on June 30, 2013 was \$455.75. Income is down about \$2,500 from the previous year.

**Reserve Fund Report:**

The balance is \$860.98.

**Memorial Fund Report:**

The balance is \$2,300.50.

**Building Fund Report:**

The balance is \$908.75 after a \$5,000 transfer to General Fund and interest of \$6.53.

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

**Building and Grounds:**

Door in fellowship hall: we will need to call a locksmith. Yard clean-up: mowing done, flower beds done.

**Christian Education Commission:**

VBS project will be replaced with a painting project in Sunday School rooms August 6 and 7. Planning an August 10 trip to the Basilica of St. Mary in Minneapolis.

**Stewardship Commission:**

No report. Haven't met yet.

**Worship Commission:**

Chairs have been rearranged in the sanctuary for summer worship. There will be a summer campfire worship on Wednesday, August 14. S'mores and worship at 6:30 P.M.

**Service Commission:**

No report.

Meeting June 23. Working on plans for the fall bazaar.
