
Empty Bowls Benefit

PASTOR'S PEN

Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

Christian Piatt, a leading thinker on the present and future of Christianity, wrote an article "Five Things that are Holding Christianity Back" (http://tinyurl.com/jvm3w2v). He lists them as church buildings, denominations, worship, church boards, and fear. It is worth reading. I highlight here his words on fear:

"Too often, our actions in church are governed principally by a response to what we fear might happen, rather than faithfully discerning what God is calling us to do. We assume that the only way to tell if we're being faithful is if the church buildings are full and the budgets are met. But this mandate is nowhere to be found in the Bible."

The mandate is to serve and love our neighbors. Piatt offers some good news that though church membership has long been declining, people's yearning for meaning has not: "there are an increasing number of people who either identify as Christian or 'other' who feel some connection to God, but who don't see the value of using Church to explore that connection. This is not necessarily an indictment of us as individuals, but rather a wake-up call to help us recognize what's really important."

Our gospel lesson on January 19 told of John of the Baptist, who was with his disciples one day. But when he saw Jesus, he stopped what he was doing to point and say to his disciples, "There is the Messiah!" John was one of those "wake-up call" types who helps us recognize was is really important: Jesus. I said in the sermon that it is easy to get caught up and spend energy on worrying about our beliefs, traditions, buildings, how we do this or how we do that, and then lose sight of the reason that we are here. John calls us (as does Piatt) to remember, "There is the Messiah!" We do this because Jesus wants people to know his love for them.

Piatt continues, with words I deeply resonate with, "relationships matter so much more than our religion, and Jesus' call is to go out among the people, not wait until they come to us." Jesus calls us out among the people in service (which we are doing through our ministries), but also among the people to invite them into this relational life we share. People come to churches because they have been invited. It sounds intimidating and new and strange to do so, yes, but remember, God is with us, so it can be done!

Piatt's final words in his article are, "Sure, it's scary, because it's vulnerable and a little bit risky. But Jesus never promised us a risk-free faith. Rather, he offered us a life filled with meaning, provided we would embrace the perfect love he offered that promised to cast out such fear."

Envelope giving is down \$8000 as of last December. Bills needing to be paid yet for 2013 are about \$4000. We need to pay OCWM, the Special offerings, Food Pantry, Snow Plowing, Kurth Heating, Pastor David's expenses, Telephone Specialists and NW Association dues. The reserve account was used help with bills, also \$1250 from the Memorial Fund and \$790 from Scrip cards.
