Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

I am excited to let you all know that we have taken on Lien & Peterson as our architects for the new building, and we have had our first meeting with them to discuss what we would like and not like in a new building. They will come back to us with a number of possible designs to look at and modify in early April. We will continue to keep you updated on what's happening.

As we approach our celebration of the day that Jesus rose from the dead, offering us all new life and rebirth, we are beginning our talks about a new building from which to continue our ministry of new life in Eau Claire. I think that is a fitting concurrence!

And speaking of Easter, please note that our Wednesday night Soup and Scriptures will end on April 5 as we finish our discussion (and finish creating our art!) about the stations of the cross. Come see the artwork we have been making. Better yet, come make art with us! Soup at 6 P.M., and discussion following.

April 9 is Palm/Passion Sunday, starting Holy Week. We will begin worship with Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, then move through Jesus' passion with a dramatization by some church members and some guests. We'll sing many of our favorite Holy Week hymns, and Cathy Reitz will share her musical talents with us as well. This is always a moving and holy service.

Thursday, April 13, is Maundy Thursday worship at 7 P.M. with Communion and Tenebrae and including music by Cathy Reitz and Sam Zehms. This is a dramatic

worship service that finishes with extinguishing lights as we read the story of Jesus' crucifixion, ending in complete darkness and silence. If you have joined us for this service, you know how moving it is. If you haven't, I highly recommend that you join us this year.

Friday, April 14 is Good Friday, and our worship will be at First Congregational at 12 noon (310 Broadway).

Passion Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday give the proper context for the miraculous resurrection day of Easter. The hopelessness of Jesus' final week, that darkness of death and time in the tomb, and his absence on Holy Saturday make the joy and hope of Easter morning all that much more real and hopeful!

Then April 16 is Easter! Join us that morning at 8:30 A.M. for a breakfast of muffins, juice, milk, and coffee, then celebration worship at 9:30 A.M. We have spent Lent talking about gratitude in good times and in dark times. That can all come to fruition on Easter morning! Show your gratitude and reconfirm your desire to follow Jesus by joining us for worship that will include Cathy Reitz and Sam Zehms singing and our Plymouth Brass Trio on horns. Please do note that we have been worshiping on Easter at an earlier time, and will continue that tradition this year: 9:30 A.M.

Have a blessed final weeks of Lent and a joyful, hopeful, gratitude-filled Easter season!

March 2017

Minutes from the February meeting were reviewed and accepted as written.

Financial Reports:

As of February 28, 2017 Year to Date Income \$13,919.05 Year to Date Expenses \$13,931.84 Ahead (Behind) (\$12.79)

Treasurer's Report:

Income for February was \$5,154.74. This is down approximately \$2,700 from the previous year. We had a loss of (\$12.79) for February.

Bank balance at the end of February: \$346.36

Reserve Fund Balance: \$1,033.31

Memorial Fund Balance: \$6,977.23

The financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Building and Grounds:

We discussed insurance changes during our time at Grace Lutheran. See Old Business.

Stewardship:

A letter will be sent to members regarding pledges as there were a lot less this year.

Worship:

Lenten Services—Wednesday soup suppers are ongoing. We could use more participants. We are coloring posters regarding stations of the cross after a very good meal.

Service:

Keep calling and visiting members and let Mimi know if you have contacted someone. Thank you.

Pastor's Report:

He reminded us of the Annual Association Meeting in Wausau on April 29. Business will be voting on changes to the by-laws. (They are already done—just need to be voted on.)

Old Business:

- RE: New insurance plan---It will be temporary because of rental space and not our whole building. We will receive approximately \$7,700 in credits applied when our payments are made.
- The contract has been signed with the architects, Lein & Peterson.

New Business:

- We are looking into short term investment of some of the monies received from the insurance company to date.
- We will be meeting with the insurance company and the architects as soon as it can be set up. When we get some plans, we can talk to builders.

Meeting adjourned at 8:00 P.M.

Stand in the Light Spring Concert

Stand in the Light Choir is for people in the early to mid-stages of memory loss and their care partners. They are invited to sing, enjoy music, and socialize with others living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. The spring concert will include lots of fun songs and audience participation.

Don't forget your SCRIP cards!

We have SCRIP cards for Mega Holiday, Gordy's, Festival, and Kwik Trip. It is a painless, cost-free fundraiser for our church. Here is how it works: They are available for \$25, \$50, and/or \$100. We keep 3% of what is paid for Festival cards, 5% on Gordy's and Kwik Trip cards, and 10% on Mega Holiday cards. And at Kwik Trip, when the card is used inside the store (with some restrictions like tobacco, alcohol, stamps), they will deposit a 10% rebate into our bank account. So, for example, if you buy a \$100 Gordy's card, we pay \$95 and keep \$5 to help pay our bills. In 2016 we earned over \$1,200! This is a great way to add to our income without feeling the pinch.
