Our Moderator, Barb Kleist called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. via Zoom. Minutes of the March meeting were reviewed. Rob said the Reserve Fund balance was incorrect and should be changed to \$12,521.95. Following that correction, the minutes were approved.

Income for March was \$11,604.50. Expenses were \$11,355.89. Envelope income was \$8,160.00. Year to date, we are \$3,000 over last year and \$6,000 over the 5-year average. We transferred \$1,000.00 from the Reserve Fund. Missions are all paid through March and all bills are caught up.

Memorial Fund Balance: \$7,068.56

- Larry has applied for a federal government loan of \$10,000 to cover payroll and utilities. If we receive it and use it for those purposes, we don't have to repay it, so it works as a grant.

Pastor's Pen continued from page 1 hope that June will see the end of our Safer at Home. Whatever that time may be, we will continue to faithfully live out Jesus' command to love our neighbors by not gathering until the medical experts have determined that we can do so safely. To do otherwise would be unkind to you and to the community we are here to serve.

I alluded earlier to face masks. Some of our people have been making face masks for the hospitals and for our neighbors. Many thanks to them for their service! We have a bag of masks in the office that we are giving way to members and neighbors, so if you would like one, please contact the office. We can mail one to you, deliver it, or set it out for you to pick up—whatever your preference is. We ask only that you don't come to the office without calling first to a) make sure someone is here, b) there aren't other people here already. We want to keep contact to the barest minimum.

In 1527, during the Bubonic Plague (Black Death) Martin Luther was asked if one should flee from the plague; his answer "no" is really long, but within the pages are these faithful words: "Therefore I shall ask God mercifully to protect us. Then I shall fumigate, help purify the air, administer medicine, and take it. I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance infect and pollute others, and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me and I have done what he has expected of me and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbor need me, however, I shall not avoid place or person but will go freely, as stated above. See, this is such a God-fearing faith because it is neither brash nor foolhardy and does not tempt God." (read his whole letter here: https://tinyurl.com/w3hqnoy).

We will see each other again, and we will have a grand celebration on our first Sunday back! Until then, we remain the church, even as we are in our homes. As pastor A. W. Tozer wrote in the mid-20th century, "Keep a Christian from entering the church sanctuary, and you have not in the least bit hindered her or his worship. We carry our sanctuary with us. We never leave it."
