In the meantime, we continue our Sunday worship and evening Vespers via video; our Tuesday and Thursday videoconference Coffee and Fellowship; our letter writing and phone calling; our offerings for Community Table and others; the maintenance of our lawn and building; and all the ministries of this otherwise fully operational church.

We may have left the building, but we are most definitely not closed! Thank you all for your ministry in this time, for your love and support of each other, and for your patient endurance until such time as our health experts tell us we are okay to gather again.

Have a blessed June and enjoy the weather and the places that are open, and support your local businesses: they are our neighbors!

Financial Reports:

Income for April was \$13,689.06. Expenses were \$10,187.60. Income for April includes \$8,500 from the government loan to cover our payroll and utilities. As long as it's used for that, we don't have to repay.

Reserve Fund Balance: \$11,531.05

Memorial Fund Balance: \$6,869.56

A sum of \$150 designated for the General Fund was transferred to the General Fund and the \$200 grant for the Diaper Drive was paid out.

The financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Stewardship:

No Thrift Sale or Pie & Ice Cream Social until at least this fall, and maybe not until next year.

Worship:

We continue to do online Sunday worship and Vespers.

Building and Grounds:
