Respectfully submitted, Louise Partlow Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

November of 2020 witnesses to a significant milestone for our denomination, the United Church of Christ: our 400th year on this continent. Our predecessors the Pilgrims landed the Mayflower on Cape Cod on November 11, 1620. Four hundred years! These first Pilgrims were Puritans who were separatists from the Church of England, whose faith expression was illegal in England. After trying to live in Holland for a few years, they decided that they needed to maintain their English language and so received permission to settle a new colony in the new world. To summarize a few hundred years of history into one sentence, the separatist Puritan Pilgrims and the later non-separatist Puritans who came to North America in 1630, become the Congregationalists, and then in 1957 many thousands of Congregational congregations (including us) merged with other denominations: two that had come from Germany. (the German Evangelical and the German Reformed) and one home-grown denomination (the somewhat confusingly named Christian Church) to become the United Church of Christ.

In 1621, those Pilgrims celebrated their first day of giving thanks for the harvest after a hard year, which was the first Thanksgiving Day, which eventually became a national holiday. Our forebears' congregational polity had a significant effect on the creation of the United States of America and the formation of the U.S. Constitution. I urge you to look up the Mayflower Compact which was the set of rules those early Pilgrims used in a new experiment in self-governance.

The three UCC churches in Eau Claire have celebrated Thanksgiving with a joint worship service on Thanksgiving Eve for many years. We will do so again this year! However, because of the pandemic, it will take a different form: we will record it early in November and publish it on our church YouTube channel (with cross-posts on our Facebook page and link on our website) so it is available on Thanksgiving Eve.

And lastly, take care of your mental and physical health. Many things are certainly different this year. Between the pandemic, the election year craziness and divisions, the loss of many of our normal activities that mark the seasons (fairs, concerts, travels, holiday gatherings), new ways of shopping and being in public, extreme weather events from climate change, economic worries, and so on, we're all stressed, tired, worn out, anxious, and many other things. It is exhausting and difficult to go through such times, so if you're feeling overwhelmed or foggy or have difficulty keeping track of time and tasks that need to be done: you are definitely not alone. So please do take care of yourselves and take the time you need, and also do not hesitate to reach out. Meeting in person is not always possible, but I'm available by phone, email, text, Facebook messenger and video, and Zoom, all of which have been used to provide pastoral help and encouragement. Use whatever form you are most comfortable with. And know that you are all in my daily prayers as we work together to be God's people through this rare and difficult time.



New Garden Planned

We're planning a native species/pollinator garden at the top of the retaining wall behind the church. What a beautiful sight it will be from the sanctuary. Easy to maintain once established and good for the birds and insects.



Cindy Halfen has knowledge and experience with prairie/woodland native plants. This spring and summer she started 15 different types of prairie flower and grass from seed in containers. When the plants were large enough, she transplanted (over 350) plants in her neighborhood prairie restoration project. Cindy will be starting seeds for the neighborhood prairie again this winter/spring, so Plymouth won't have to buy seeds.



There are a few species that are hard to start from seed, like Prairie Dropseed, or grow very slowly, like Purple Poppy Mallow. These should be purchased as plants from Prairie Moon Nursery or Prairie Nursery (depending on the price). A tray of 32–36 plants costs about \$100, compared to a three-pack for \$18. You can order a mix of plants for a tray. Cindy suggests two trays. The other cost will be wood mulch after the plants are in the ground. Cindy is applying for a grant from the Creation Care program of WI Conference to cover these costs.



Work will start next spring. In preparation, someone with a chainsaw is needed to about spend one hour this winter cutting a few invasive Buckthorn trees in the area. Cindy can be there to poison the stumps with herbicide immediately after cutting.
