Empty Bowls Week

Help fight local hunger with us! This year's Empty Bowls fundraiser will be a week-long opportunity (March 1-6) to come to Feed My People and pick up a one-of-a-kind gift bag without ever leaving your vehicle. All proceeds go towards hunger-relief in west central Wisconsin.

Each gift bag includes a handcrafted bowl, local recipes, and coupons to restaurants who typically supply the meal for Empty Bowls. Additionally, you will gain access to an online silent auction, which will be open February 25–March 6. A traditional Gift Bag is \$20 and contains a randomly selected handcrafted bowl made by a local artist or student. Signature Gift Bags are \$25 and feature a special bowl designed by Scheelhouse Pottery. Supporters also have the option of purchasing a Bowl with a Bow for \$10 that will go directly to someone in need as a gift.

- The TV donated by Paul Gilbertson has been delivered.

New Business:

- Our housekeeper, Andrea, has donated her cleaning services for January.
- Cindy Halfen has completed the application for a grant from the Conference Creation Care team

Dear Friends and Family of Plymouth,

We are in the middle of Lent. If you've been joining us for worship, you know that this year I've not been in a very Lent kind of mood because in many ways, we've been in a long Lent with the pandemic, and with the short break we had between the fire and the pandemic, it's feeling like we've been in Lent for four and a half years. So for Lent this

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year, I'm thinking of it not so much as the penitential time to look within as we travel a metaphorical journey through the wilderness of Lent which is traditional, but as a time to look forward as we travel a more literal wilderness of Lent, pandemic, and other anxieties. In Lent we are always moving toward Easter, which is a beautiful place to point: the wilderness ends with Easter resurrection, new life, second chances, a rebirth into something new and wondrous...

We will celebrate Easter on April 4, as that is the day that the calendar has assigned to celebrate Easter. But we will celebrate another Easter later this year. We don't know when that will be. But we can see it on the horizon now. That's what I'm looking toward this year during Lent: the time when the pandemic is gone and we are worshiping in person, going to concerts, having friends over for supper, and holding potluck lunches after worship again! As people are vaccinated, as the Covid numbers hopefully continue to decline, and as the rest of the world does so, we will be able to resume the lives we had grown accustomed to.

In our looking forward, though, let it not be only a return to the normal we once knew; let this wilderness journey be a learning experience to create a new normal. A new normal in which we don't take meals with friends for granted, or take the availability of worshipping in person for granted, or take our relationships for granted. Let us be a people who have learned the depth of the systemic racism in our country and strive to change it; let us be a people who have witnessed the growth in numbers and public display of white supremacy, and strive to end it. Let us be a people who have learned the truly precarious position of people who live in poverty or on the edge of it; the financial anxiety of farmers; and the lack of Internet in rural areas. Let us be a people who have learned that family activities are very important and that other things should be scheduled around them, and not schedule family around other activities. And as a former grocery store clerk, I hope that we will be a people who realize just how important our grocery and other retail workers are, the cooks and delivery people, the waitstaff and the janitors, and especially our nurses, doctors, and medical scientists.

As you look forward this Lent, what are you seeing, what do you hope to see, and who would you like to be?
