Our Moderator, Barb Kleist called the meeting to order at 7:03 P.M. Minutes of the August meeting were reviewed and approved.

Financial Reports:

Treasurer's Report:

Envelope income was \$2,000 less than last year, but over the average for August. All regular bills, OCWM, and Community Table were paid.

Memorial Fund Balance: \$10,595.11

Reserve Fund Balance: \$7,360.20

Financials reports were reviewed and accepted.

Stewardship:

• The price of nuts has gone up \$2.00 across the board. We'll take orders starting now and order from Finotte's in October for delivery in November.

Worship:

- Barb and Larry will be gone September 22–October 13. Deb Zehms will fill in and do the things Barb does on Sunday mornings.
- Worldwide Communion Sunday is October 3, All Saints' Sunday is November 7, and Advent begins November 28.

Building and Grounds:

• Larry thinks our snow plow provider will probably do sidewalks/stairs/etc. but we are still waiting to hear what he will charge for that.

Pastor's Report:

- He will be gone October 3–5, and the weekend of October 10 he will attend a Native American event at Pilgrim Center, so we'll have a guest preacher.
- Pilgrim Center has been renamed Daycholah Center. Daycholah is the original Ho-Chunk name for Green Lake.
- He will get together with prospective members next week to plan a New Member Sunday.
- The local Mennonite congregation has no building in which to meet. They have eight or so members, and have been meeting in homes once a month. David will speak with Lorin Divine who is Mennonite (he and his family have been worshiping with us for a while) to see if they would like to use our building.

Old Business:

• Prairie Restoration project is moving ahead.

New Business:

- With the new surge in Covid cases in the area, the Leadership Team decided to cancel the Bazaar. We didn't want to have to enforce a masking rule.
- We discussed dartball. So far, no one has given a schedule or asked for a key to use our building, so we don't know if they have decided to play elsewhere or merely suspended because of Covid.

Meeting adjourned at 7:40. Our next meeting will be Tuesday, November 9 in person at church.

Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

Welcome to Autumn, everyone! The move from summer to fall, and September into October, always feels to me like rounding a corner into the final stretch of the year. A final stretch that seems to have a much higher percentage of the year's activities than it should have: football, apple picking, corn mazes, crop harvesting, Halloween, All Souls/Saints Day, Daylight Savings Time ends, Holiday Bazaars, Thanksgiving, Advent, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, performing arts groups do fall concerts in October and Christmas ones in December, Christmas parties, Christmas pageants, Christmas shopping, public school and college finals week. Christmas Eve. Christmas Day, and then New Years Eve. Whew! It's a lot, but the older I get, the more I look forward to this stretch (especially now that I don't have to take finals). There is something cozy about this time of year as the temperature goes down and crisps the air, we dust off the slow cookers, the sun goes down earlier enveloping our part of the world in a cocoon of darkness the majority of each day. We have the rituals of worship on Sunday mornings and football in the afternoons; trick or treating; gatherings for feasts on holidays; preparing for the coming snows and a sense of "pack in all the fun you can because January and February are coming!"

This cycle has become a comfortable rhythm over the years. Rituals help us remember who we are as we repeat them, share them with our children, and watch them slowly adapt to changing circumstances. These rituals provide markers for ordering our lives, turning everyday acts into

significant ones. These rituals, whether of the church, our families, or our nation, provide a framework on which to hang our life events, and they can help give meaning to our lives. When they happen, they bring comfort and a sense of rightness with the world. When they are interrupted, it can cause stress and anxiety. And we've definitely had our share of interruptions over

the past five years. I'm writing this on the fifth anniversary of our fire, an event that interrupted our rhythm, requiring us to create new rituals and adapt old ones. Then the pandemic came, and we've had to do it again. Interruptions take energy to deal with, and they can become tiring. Plymouth has been asked to do a lot of adapting over the past five years; and as a world, we've been asked to do a lot over the past 19 months.

There is Good News in this, though: we have done it! The Holy Spirit has been with us through all of our interruptions. Our worship attendance has increased, we gained new members, the spirit of giving has increased, we developed new ways to worship in person and online, our reach has expanded, we started a native species reclamation project, we continued to pray for and serve one another. It's looked different, but it's still the same Spirit and the same God who has inspired it all.

And nature, of course, continues its cycle, which I find to be a place of solid ground in the midst of the anxiety. If the pumpkins can continue to grow, if the birds can continue to migrate, if the rivers can continue to flow and the rains keep coming and the sun keeps rising and setting, then I can, too, and we can, too. For me, they are a sign of God's constancy: just as nature is reliably what it is, so also God is reliable and constant. And thus no matter what else is happening, the seasons and God will still cycle us through a harvest, Halloween, Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas, and all those other things, and then move us into next year to begin the cycle anew.
