## **Food for Thought**

We are still recording our worship service to view on Facebook, for those who feel safer at home or can't make it to worship. Please make sure you are vaccinated and boosted. This makes everyone feel safer and maybe we can get rid of COVID sooner. Even after you receive it, make sure you stay safe. Masks are available at church, for those who would still like to wear one.

Please don't forget our homeless friends. They especially need backpacks (larger in size, not child/youth size, please), gas cards (OK for "Fuel Only"), small tents (1–2 person), T-shirts (clean and in good repair) XL, 2XL, food cards for fast food, convenience stores, etc. We have a drop off box at church and whatever is donated will be taken to Good Shepherd weekly. July birthdays, it's your turn to think about making a donation to our Birthday Challenge. We are challenging you to make a donation in your birthday month corresponding to your age or whatever amount you are comfortable with. The money will be put toward future capital improvements, such as parking lot resurfacing. Now that we have changed our garbage carrier to Earthbound Environmental Services, we have three types of trash cans. There's a regular trash can, a recycling trash can and a compost trash can. Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

Thank you for your cards, texts, messages, and especially your prayers in the last month as I've been dealing with Covid and fractured ribs. Your notes and messages lift my spirits, and knowing that you are holding me in prayer makes the process bearable. I am grateful for the healing power of your concern and for your patience in giving me the needed time to heal. Gratitude also for our lay leadership who are taking care of things, including leadership on Sunday mornings (and even leading worship without me for two Sundays). Plymouth is in faithful, capable, and loving hands!

Your prayers are helping. I'm feeling better every day. While I wish it would go a lot faster than it has been, recovery from illness moves at the pace it needs to move. We can't rush it, we can only be patient while the healing work is done knowing only that it will be over at some point. That said, I do hope to be back to normal soon, because let's be honest: being sick is the pits and I'm tired of it.

Right before getting sick I had a week of study leave to attend the Festival of Homiletics (the festival of preaching I attend almost every year). It was absolutely wonderful and filled my spiritual and pastoral bucket. The theme was preaching after a time of trauma. The trauma being the two years of the pandemic and the adjustments that churches had to make, the new things that pastors and lay leaders needed to learn and adapt to, and the adjustment of coming into a post-pandemic time. But right before the festival was the shooting in Buffalo by a white supremacist, as well as some other events, and so our preachers and lecturers also spoke on the trauma of mass shootings, the lasting legacy and present reality of racism, the uptick in white supremacy, the toxicity of our public discourse, and the shrinking influence of mainline Christianity.

I wish I could say they offered all the answers and that I could summarize them in the next sentences. Reality, however, is not that simple. But there was one consistent message from the presenters, which is the message the church is entrusted to proclaim: that God's intent for us is love. For all the challenges that face us, we have an answer in Jesus' vision of a world of compassion, empathy, mercy, sharing, and love. It's a message of hope—it lets us know that we change and live into that vision and that the way things are is not the way they have to be or will always be. Even when it is difficult and slow and we lament, "How long, Lord? How Long?," we can make a more loving world by following in Jesus' path.

That's the vision that Plymouth strives to live into with our ministries in our community: our quilters, giving to and serving at the Community Table, offering our building to local service groups, being Open and Affirming, and so on, and now including our Little Library along our sidewalk on Moholt, the backpacks we'll be donating, and the work we are doing to in making our lawn more environmentally friendly and replanting our property with pollinator gardens and native species.

We aren't called to heal the whole world, but we are called to heal the little bit of it that we inhabit. So let us continue to heal and to show our neighbors the hope that we have for a better way into a better future. Jesus' message of hope doesn't come with a timeline, but it does come with the promise that healing is, indeed, possible.

## **Financial Reports:**

## **Treasurer's Report:**

Year to Date envelope income of \$54,320 is \$30,500 more than last year at this time and \$27,000 over the 5-year average.

The financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

## **Building and Grounds:**

- Larry will no longer do the mowing. The last time he did so, he nearly toppled over doing the "bowl" portion of the yard. He felt it was too risky to continue, especially since he's usually here alone when mowing and if there were an accident, no one would know and be able to get help.
- The Team decided to have Bluecoat do the mowing at a cost of approximately \$100-\$125 per week.

## **Pastor's Report:**

- He learned a lot and enjoyed the Festival of Homiletics he attended.
- He expressed his thanks for all the prayers and get well wishes he's received.

## **Old Business:**

- The "Little Library" is up and stocked with books. There was an ant problem, but Cindy was able to take care of it.
- Speaking of libraries, there will be a "Plymouth Library" on the small table in the corner of the fellowship room. We have so many books. Congregation members will be encouraged to take one/leave one/switch out/keep the ones available.
- We have received a new shipment of LED light bulbs (free) so we will put some out for people to take as many as they'd like and keep reminding them to do so.

## New Business:

- We will participate in the We Care Eau Claire program to provide backpacks filled with supplies for kids in the Eau Claire School District. There will be an article in the July newsletter with all the details.
- We will volunteer for service at the Community Table in September, probably on a weekend day. Watch for details to come.
- We need to get a TV cart for the large TV in the fellowship room. That way it can be moved easily and safely and placed wherever it's needed.

Meeting adjourned at 7:40 P.M. There will be no Leadership Team meeting in July. Our next meeting will be August 9, 2022 at 7:00 P.M.
