## What is a pastoral sabbatical and why should we do it?

### A definition of a pastoral sabbatical:

The pastor is given paid leave for rest, rejuvenation, and perhaps deeper study. It is a break from a job that provides a person a change of pace, allowing them to be more effective at the position upon their return.

## Reasons this is important for pastors, especially following the pandemic:

- A pastor has emotional highs and lows unlike most other vocations, which can be emotionally draining.
- Pastors need a break with no distractions to refuel, and the church will benefit.
- A pastor is on call 24/7 which, over time, can become physically and emotionally draining.
- Pastors who have sabbaticals seem to have longer tenure at churches as they are less likely to experience burnout.
- Pastors who have sabbaticals view the time off as an affirmation from their churches. Recognizing the need for a sabbatical, and then making it happen for a pastor, shows the pastor that the congregation genuinely cares about their welfare.

In the past several years, our church burned, we went through the construction of our new church, and shortly after that, the pandemic hit. Pastor David found ways to hold us together through all of that, while also involved in the planning of the new church and navigating the uncharted waters of church life during the pandemic. A sabbatical would say to him, "You are important to us. We care about your well being."

Kendi's book "How to be an Anti-Racist," a very timely and important topic, given our current uptick in racism. You don't need to read the book, but I recommend it: I just started and am about halfway through, and finding it eye-opening and very helpful in better understanding issues around racism and its active opposite, anti-racism. Jesus was always expanding the idea of who is "in," and I find Kendi's thoughtful writing to be helpful in how we can keep expanding that idea, too.

During Holy Week, we have our traditional Maundy Thursday service, though please note that we've moved it to 2 P.M.

Good Friday worship will be our ecumenical worship service First Congregational UCC (310 Broadway) at noon.

Easter morning, join us for Magnificent Muffins at 9:30 A.M. and then celebration worship at 10:30 A.M. with lots of great music and our Easter Alleluias about the risen Christ.
