We are still recording our worship service to view on Facebook, for those who feel safer at home or can't make it to worship. Masks are always available at church if you would like

to wear one.

Please don't forget our homeless friends. Mike and his crew are out checking on the homeless to make sure they are okay. Please keep them in your prayers. With federal funding

being cut, there are very few options for the homeless. We have a collection box in the Gathering area for clothing, or else you can send a check to CVSM, PO Box 51, Eau Claire, WI 54702-0051. Here is a needs list from the Street Ministry: men's tennis shoes, sizes 11-13; sweatpants, sizes M, L, XL; T-shirts, sizes L, XL, 2XL & 3XL; socks, ankle & crew; regular sweatshirts, L & XL; hoodies, L, XL, 2XL; tents, 1-2. Also, monetary gifts are very welcome. They purchase city bus passes to provide to those who need transportation to work or appointments. Also if they need some items not donated, they have to purchase them.

Also, don't forget our Birthday Challenge. We are challenging you to make a donation in your birthday month corresponding to your age. The money will be put toward our next big repair project, which now is a new copier for the office. September birthdays—it's your turn. Plus if anyone wants to give extra toward a new copier, now's a perfect time.

Dear Plymouth,

September is my favorite month of the year. I'll admit that my like of September is probably because it's my birthday month, but there are other things about September that resonate with me. First, no matter how warm it may be in September, there's no doubt that fall is coming (Fall is my favorite season of the year!). The cooling temperatures, changing leaves, and fall foods excite me more than any other season. There's also the fact that school starts in September, certain routines start again, and many activities "start up" in September.

Your favorite season may not be fall. Spring is a good contender for many because it's always uplifting to see the buds on the trees and everything starting to come alive again after winter. Some may love summer because they like it warm and to go on vacation or sit out on the patio or deck on a warm evening. Treasurer's Report:

Year to date envelope income is \$9,744 less than last year at this point, but still more than the YTD average going back to 2009. \$9,000 was transferred from the Reserve Fund. Expenses included lawn mowing for June and July and building insurance. OCWM and Community Table payments were caught up for amounts given through June.

- The last Transition Experience handout will be August 17. Following that, Bill will do a Summary of all the hand-outs and we will ask the congregation for their feed-back in September.

New Business:

• We briefly discussed the fact that Pastor Michael's contract is up on December 31. If we want to make his position here permanent, we will need a congregational vote. It's possible that we could extend his contract for one month and then have the congregation vote at the Annual Meeting.
