

Advent Candle Lighting-Hope 🕆

- When hope hangs low in the human heart, you, loving creator, kindle L: compassion, breathing life into the early embers of change and empathy.
- As God spoke through Jeremiah, "The days are surely coming when I will **P**: fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel. In that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David, and he will execute justice and righteousness in the land."
- L: Yet we look around and see shadows of despair. We are in a time of pandemic. So many neighbors here and around the world will go to bed hungry tonight.
- We see shadows of injustice. The rich get richer and the poor get poorer, **P:** and tonight some of our neighbors will sleep, or try to sleep, under a bridge, in a doorway, on a park bench, or other place that they cannot call "home."
- We light a candle this morning, this candle of Hope, sending our prayers into **R**: inky shadows as our protest against them, proclaiming that as God's people we are bearers of hope, and that no darkness can withstand God's holy light.
- All: May this light shine brightly to eliminate the shadows of the world, and may it enter into our hearts to dispel our own shadows, making room in our hearts for the poor, the homeless, the oppressed, the prisoners, and all without hope, that we may shine your light into all areas of despair. Make of our hearts a stable that we may have room to hold those whom you deem to be precious.
