
Advent Candle Lighting—Joy ♥

- L: Siblings in Christ, be not afraid, God's joy is at hand!
- P: To the Jewish people who were in despair in exile, the prophet Zephaniah said: "Sing aloud and shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home. I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth when I restore your fortunes before your eyes." Zephaniah 3:14–20
- L: Joy is not a commodity to be bought or sold, but lives deep in the human spirit; and the human spirit lives deep in God's spirit.
- P: Make of our hearts a stable to hear and trust your truth. Help us to let go of what the agents of deception tell us will bring us joy but bring only more emptiness: money, success, material goods, pursuing the latest fads, the scramble to the top. If we have robbed others of what they need in our fruitless quest to live in excess, forgive us, God of joy, and recenter our hearts.
- L: We light a candle this morning, this candle of Joy. We see the shadows of sadness, families who have lost loved ones, people in prison, people who are isolated and feel on their own, we see the shadows of grief, people dreading the holidays because of painful memories, or because they don't want to spend another Christmas alone.

All: We offer this candle's light as our protest against all that tries to separate us from God's joy. May this joy enter our hearts to dispel despair, cynicism, and ingratitude, making room for God. May this candle's light say to the world that God's joy is present on earth as it is in heaven. As we hope for your arrival, as we pray for peace in your living, as we wait and watch and wonder how you might reveal yourself to us, God, give us joy in your Advent.

- L: May the God who saves us be with you.
- P: May the God of redemption be with you.
- L: Let us offer our hearts to our God of grace.
- P: We open them that God may fill them with life and hope.
- L: Out of the dried up well called chaos, you brought forth creation gushing with living waters that ran through valleys towards oceans, that sprinkled flowers on forest floors, that gave nourishment to birds, animals, and those shaped in your image. We could have lived with you in that garden of wonder and delight, but we listened to the temptations offered to us by the powers of deceitful joy. You then sent us prophets, time and again, shouting in the courtyards and from the rooftops to return to you, but we ignored them to pursue the empty path of temptation. Then, in your love and with your hope, you chose to become one of us, Jesus being born into our lives.
- P: Holy, holy, holy are you, God of Advent hope. We rejoice with all creation in praising you. Hosanna in the highest!
- L: God of this season, you chose to be embodied in Jesus. Rejecting power, his weakness raises the fallen to their feet; refusing to be afraid, he whispers to us to trust; unable to exclude the forgotten, he welcomes those we failed to make room for and shoved to the side to be forgotten by us; doing all he could for others, he finally submitted to his executioners so that by his death and resurrection we, too, are raised from the ways of death to live into your hope, peace, joy, and love.
- P: His resurrection gives us new hope and life. We bear the fruit of his grace and life.
- L: O holy God of the ages, may your Spirit descend upon those of us gathered and on the gifts of your table. May the broken bread feed us and reshape our fragmented lives so we may make greater room in the stables of our hearts for those around us. May we draw compassion from the deep wells of the cup of grace, so we may go forth to serve others, as your agents of joy.
- P: And when all time and history has ended and we are brought home at the last, we will sing joyfully with all the saints.

Questions for Reflection
