

Greetings

Advent Candle Lighting−Love 🕆

- L: Siblings in Christ, be not afraid, for now—even now!—God's love is overwhelming the world, on earth as it is in heaven.
- P: The prophet Micah spoke of God's love when the Israelites were facing their own turbulent times: "But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel. And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth; and he shall be the one of peace." (Micah 5:2, 5a)
- L: Our neighbors wander in the wilderness, too many are trapped in valleys of the shadow of death, our conversations are laced with too many wounding words, too many people suffer, and we're often too distracted or self-centered to make room in our hearts to be God's loving neighbors.
- P: But love shines in the darkness and sings in the shadows. It does not cower and cannot be contained. It is the hope of the saints and the call of the prophets.
- L: Today we stop everything and light these candles: one for hope, one for peace, one for joy, and the last one for love. Love was the fire in the belly of John the Baptist and Love was the courage of mother Mary. Love will lead us home.
- P: May the light from these candles overwhelm the apathy, hate, and divisiveness of the world. May they light the valleys of the shadow of death. May the light and fire from these candles burn away all our excuses, all our hesitations, all our elaborate justifications that prevent God's love from being born among us. Let these lights inspire us to make our hearts, our lives, our church, a stable for God's love to grow and expand into all the recesses of this world which God loves so much.

Matthew 1:18–24

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly.
